STEP 1 of 4:

"Just Ask! A Pin that is designed to guide your club through the process of recruiting new members and effectively managing club growth. The strength of your membership and the health of your club will determine your ability to do what all Lions love to do – serve. So keep in mind that more members mean more service. Although the concept is simple – just ask community members to join – the following steps will help you prepare an effective outreach plan so you are successful when you're ready to ask. Just Ask! Will lead your club through a four-step process for recruiting new members: 1. Preparing your club; 2. Creating your club's growth plan; 3. Implementing your club's growth plan; 4. Welcoming your new member.

STEP 1: PREPARE YOUR CLUB: The first step to inviting new members to join your Lions club is to get your club ready. • Decide what you want your club to be. • What does your club want to focus on? • What do your members want your club to be? • How do you envision your club next year? Five years from now? • Identify what you want your club to accomplish. • What type of service projects does your club want to conduct? • How often? • Where? • Decide what your goals are. Use the Recruiting Goals form to define your club membership goals. Be sure to consider how new members will fit in with your objectives.

define your club membership goals. Be sure to consider how new members will fit in with your objectives. • Why does your club want new members? Before you begin inviting new members, it is important to identify why. The answer should be clear, tangible and relevant, not simply "for more service." For example: "If we had 3 more members, we could pack 100 more lunches for the homeless each month." • Who are your target members? Are they younger members, women, community professionals, parents of Leos, family members or friends? Your club may have more than one target group. Keep in mind that when recruiting new members, it often works best to recruit a group of 2-4 people. • Who will help your club recruit? Although everyone in your club should be encouraged to help recruit new members, a membership development team should be selected to guide the recruitment effort. Use the Membership Development Team form to organize your team. Each member has strengths and preferences. Make the most of these by encouraging your members to take on roles in the recruiting process. Important roles include: • Organizing – Some members are planners; they see each step and can prioritize what needs to be done. These Lions should focus on guiding your club's recruiting effort. • Promoting – Tech-savvy and creative members can create brochures, issue your press releases, and update your website and social media networks. • Reaching Out – These are your Lions that like to talk, especially about your club. Encourage them to promote Lions to your target groups and get them on the phone with prospective new members. • Welcoming - Lions who are trained to conduct new member orientation and coordinate mentoring will ensure your new members feel welcome and quickly settle into your club. LCI provides training for both orientation and mentoring." Look for Step 2 next month unless you are anxious to learn more!!!!

This is only Step 1 and a good place to start – watch for Step 2, 3 and 4 or if you are fired up and want to jump ahead then please go to Lionsclubs.org and in search box put "Just Ask", this will pull up the Just Ask Guide with all the steps. This is good stuff and I hope every Lion reading this Blog will attempt to print this guide (23 pages).

Our Centennial Coordinator, PID Hauser Weiler, will talk more about the Centennial of Service in this and future editions of the Knight's Vision. Please support this worthwhile goal of LCI.

One final note. I need your help next year. I am trying to put together a viable cabinet of officers and committee chairs. Please consider volunteering, if you are interested in helping. When asked, please say yes. I can't do it alone. Our District and Lions as a whole can only succeed if we work together.

"Our manner goals include creating an environment of respect and good culture to create the Best base for children to be successful in life," explained Sally Dickinson, Barrier Islands Center Director of Education. Dickinson goes on to explain how history comes to life through creative lessons taught during the four visits the children make to BIC over a semester. She highlights a music lesson where the preschoolers learn the history of Cobb Island by viewing a harp used to entertain guests staying at the once famous Cobb's Island Hotel. Art teacher Charlene Huh, using her gentle ways and incredibly original art projects, works her magic in engaging children in the creative process of art. Each art lesson introduces a "master" artist to the students. As children are introduced to Katsushika Hokuasi, a Japanese artist world renown for his wave paintings, the lesson quickly moves into an interactive tutorial on peninsula living and the



Atlantic Ocean while the preschoolers create their own wave paintings. Children of migrant workers are included in the program over the summer semester which ends with an art work exposition during an open house for family members. In fact, Dickinson believes that involving parents is an added bonus of the program for BIC. Both local, public, and private schools support the program by providing transportation for *My First Field Trip*. "BIC is working hard to engage community partners, children and their families in this worthwhile instructional program. That's why the Lions Clubs of the Eastern Shore felt it was important to get involved," said John

Kluis, President of the Onancock Lions Club. A delegation of Lions had the opportunity to witness these creative learning techniques first-hand when they visited BIC to present the \$10,000 donation. "We were very impressed by the energy of Martha Giles, the music teacher. She had the kids completely captivated

by the use of bells to teach them the music scale. The students' positive energy and enthusiasm for learning was absolutely contagious," said Steve Warren, President of the Cape



Charles Lions Club. Everyone enjoyed the day interacting with the children, listening to their first attempts to play different musical instruments, and watching their eyes light up as they learned something new. Lion Don Fuller, President of the Lions Charity Foundation, sums it up best. "As Lions, we strive to provide educational opportunities for the youth in our communities. Our Lions Charity Foundation of District 24D is here to assist Lions Clubs to turn this goal into a reality through financial support. We are excited to continue our partnership with the Barrier

Islands Center's My First Field Trip educational program."
