Diabetes Awareness Projects Part Two By Lion Don Butts, District 24-I Diabetes Awareness Chairperson

As we learned in part one, diabetes and pre-diabetes are very common. Many don't know they have the disease. Some will be willing to make the necessary life style changes when we help them discover they have the disease. In part two we will identify some additional projects that may take a little more work than those identified in part one. They may also be more satisfying to complete.

Consider partnering with healthcare professionals to organize a screening for diabetes. How extensive do you want your screening to be? You could do a diabetes risk assessment. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the American Diabetes Association and others have diabetes risk assessment forms. You merely assist participants in answering questions on the assessment form to demonstrate their risk for diabetes. You may want to involve health care professionals from within or outside your club. They could screen for blood glucose or A1C. You may want to include the necessary health care professionals to screen for retinopathy and diabetic foot. Do you want the screening to be a stand alone event, or held in combination with other events, such as your club's sight and hearing screening or a community health fair?

Promote diabetes prevention through social media campaigns or radio announcements. The key word is "campaigns". In part one we discussed a few projects using social media. Now we are talking about planning a sequence of posts over a period of time to tell a more complete story.

Volunteer at a diabetes camp. Contact Lion Chet Kramer to determine how much help he needs with our district diabetes camp. Find out when and where he needs the help. Then recruit volunteers from your club. You could also contact free clinics in your community to determine if they need volunteer administrative help with diabetes clinics.

Provide healthy cooking demonstration for people with diabetes and pre-diabetes. This is one you could do while we are still under Covid 19 restrictions. Members of one of the clubs in our district took turns cooking healthy meals for zoom audiences. Videos of the demonstrations may be posted on club web sites.

Organize a weekly walking club and share a healthy snack afterwards. Instead of a snack, you may persuade a restaurant to offer a healthy meal for 10 or 15% off. The walking club may be at your place of work, a local gym or community recreation center. Walkers don't have to be diabetic, just people wanting to get additional exercise. However, you may encourage diabetes educators to try to get patients to join the club. It may even be possible to team up an experienced diabetics to walk with someone recently diagnosed.



Bring fresh fruits or vegetables to an elementary school classroom to encourage children to try a variety of healthy foods. The school nurse you met while doing vision screening could help with this project. It may work to do this in health or physical education classes. Perhaps you could get a dietitian to say a few words about the value of fresh fruits and vegetables.

Provide funding to a "free clinic" for testing supplies, or medicine. Meet with the medical director or administrator of a local free clinic to learn if they could help more people if they had additional funds. If you decide to provide funding, you may want to get annual or semiannual reports indicating what was accomplished with those funds. For example: If you provided money for testing supplies, how many people were tested? How many had diabetes, or pre-diabetes? How many were helped by a diabetes educator? How many remain patients of the clinic and continue to receive care for diabetes or pre-diabetes?

We have officially hit the halfway point in the 2020 – 2021 fiscal year. Despite all the obstacles this year, our district is still demonstrating strong dedication to online and in-person trainings. And, the best news yet... our training calendar is still overflowing with leadership development opportunities for the second half of the year. January will feature another Leadership Friday, February will offer classes during Winter Conference, the Regional Lions Leadership Institute will be held in March, April is always busy training incoming club officers during Leadership Training Days, and May will complete our year training incoming Zone and Region Chairs. Whew, I'm tired just thinking about all the exciting events we are planning for you. Here are just a few highlights of the upcoming projects.

Leadership Fridays: January 8, 2021 Online 7:00 – 8:00 PM 1st VDG Greg Cole Succession Planning: Succession Planning helps ensure the long-term vitality of Lions Clubs through a carefully planned system of identifying and preparing new leaders for all levels. This course demonstrates how to identify and develop new leaders; and how to plan and prepare for a successful leadership transition. **Winter Conference:**

We are still in the planning stage for Winter Conference classes. There will be courses in the areas of service, membership, leadership, and communications. In addition, a three-hour session to certify Guiding Lions will also be held. Here's a little more about the Certified Guiding Lion program.

The Guiding Lion Program is designed to assist clubs that are newly chartered, established or in the rebuilding process. A Guiding Lion is assigned to a new club or a priority club by the District Governor, in consultation with the sponsoring club or established club president, for a two-year term. Guiding Lions must become certified by attending the course or participating online and passing the certification exam. Certification is good for three-years. If you are an experienced Lion, comfortable recruiting new members, training others and have a passion for service please consider joining this class. Contact PDG Debbie Ivey to register. So, what do I do as a Guiding Lion for a club?

Guiding Lions for a new club:

- Ensure the club is successful in the first two-years of operation
- Orient and train club officers and members
- Motivate and support club growth and development
- Locate resources available to assist the club

Guiding Lion support for existing and rebuilding clubs:

- Rebuilding through Build a Vision Assessment
- Recruiting new members
- Training new officers
- Providing meaningful community service

Regional Lions Leadership Institute:

The Virginia Regional Lions Leadership Institute (RLLI) is a three-day course scheduled for April 30- May 2, 2021 in Roanoke, VA. RLLI helps Lions in Virginia achieve leadership excellence in their volunteer and personal lives. This is a dynamic educational opportunity for club officers to gain critical leadership skills. Lions from around Virginia gather to improve their public speaking skills, learn how to motivate club members, hear advice on time management, and tips for conflict resolution. Competent Club Presidents know the value of courses in setting and achieving goals, team work and the fundamentals of Lionism. The Leadership Institute utilizes the talents of skilled, experienced individuals to present information on topics that will be of tremendous benefit to you in both your future service in Lions, as well as your career and personal interactions. The District Governor can endorse ten candidates from District 24-I. Lodging and meals are provided for the three-day event. Attendees are responsible for travel expenses and a \$150 participant fee.
