Everywhere you looked, Lions and Auxilians were hard at work. The Auxiliary's Fair Kitchen operated from 7:30 am 'til 11 each night to feed fair staff and hungry visitors. It seemed my mother and I were there every waking minute during Fair Week. All of the Lions kids spent the afternoons after school doing homework until the supper rush. For over 30 years, Lions Clubs around the world have proudly sponsored the Lions International Peace Poster contest in schools and organized youth groups in their communities. This art contest for kids encourages young people world-wide to express their visions of peace. The theme of the 2021 – 2022 Peace Poster Contest is "We Are All Connected." While overcoming challenges brought on by an unprecedented global pandemic, we're celebrating the things that keep us connected - to each other, to our communities, all together around the world. Students, ages 11, 12 or 13 as of November 15, 2021, are eligible to participate. Each poster is judged on originality, artistic merit, and expression of the theme.



Posters advance through several judging levels: local, district, multiple district and international. At the international level, judges from the art, peace, youth, education and media communities select one grand prize winner and 23 merit award winners. The grand prize winner receives \$5,000 and a trip to a special awards ceremony. Each of the 23 merit award winners receives a cash award of \$500 and a certificate of merit. There is also a Peace Essay Contest for Blind and Vision Impaired children with the same theme, age requirements, and grand prize. Check out the 2020 – 2021 Peace Essay Contest winner reading his essay on the Lions YouTube Channel. He will inspire you. If your club is looking for a new service project to engage your community, this project fits the bill. Your club must order one Peace Poster Kit for each contest you wish to run. The deadline for kits is October 1, 2021. Although November 15 is the postmark deadline for clubs to submit one winning poster (per contest) to the District Governor; our District Peace Poster Chair, Lisa Tharp, requests posters be sent to her by November 5,2021. Posters will be displayed and judged at Fall Conference. A Peace Poster Project Planner will be e-mailed to your club soon.

I want to give you an update on the Lions Sports Explosion Weekend, the camp for blind and vision impaired students, planned for October 2021. Unfortunately, the decision has been made to postpone the debut of the camp until October 2022. This decision wasn't made lightly. It was based on advice of medical professionals and Old Dominion staff. This doesn't mean the committee will stop working on the project. The flyers and registration forms will be published in a future Roar issue. If you'd like to volunteer on the district committee, please contact PCC Chet Kramer.

Just a reminder that September is Childhood Cancer Awareness Month and October is Vision Awareness Month. Traditionally Lions participate in World Sight Day on October 8th but plan a project that works for your club. You can get project ideas on the Lions Clubs International website under the project service planners' area. Finally, please remember to report your service in MyLion.

As an organization, Lions struggle with self-promotion. Below are some ideas you could utilize to sell your club.

- When fundraising attach a sheet to the purchased item that: lists what your club does as charitable work and/or list the places your club donates to, asks if they want to become a Lion (make the way you ask unique/stand out), explains what Lions Club are and do
- Generate a business card with your clubs meeting date/time and location on the back inviting them to dinner.
- Visit/meet with local businesses in the area. Ask them for a donation....not of money but of one volunteer to join the club. Businesses would be more likely to give a new member versus a monetary donation.
- Have pens made with your Clubs meeting information and contact information on it. Pens travel, get put down, someone else picks them up.
- Shirts. We all get club shirts with the Lions logo on the pocket. Aim for something more visual.
- Wear your pin you hear it all the time and it sounds simple. 24 I has a club whose members tattle on each other if they are not wearing their pin outside of Lions functions. (This club is one of the largest club in 24 - I)
- Invite a local newspaper reporter/radio personality/news anchor to speak at your meeting. Engage them. Ask them directly what your club needs to do to get an item on their platform.
- Team up with the local Boy Scouts when they do their food drives. When they hand out their collection bags to the community ask them to put a bag inside that your club has had made up to collect eyeglasses. The bag can contain information about Lions/Your Club/ Asking them to join.
- Set up posts on social media Facebook, Twitter, Snapchat, etc. but also seek out websites that allow you post your clubs information with the keyword "Service": Next Door, VolunteerMatch.org, Meet Up, Idealist.org, HandsOn Network

# CENTRAL VIRGINIA LIONS HEARING AID BANK NEWS

The Central Virginia Lions Hearing Aid Bank (the Bank) is pleased to announce that it placed 70 hearing aids with 53 deserving citizens for the last fiscal year that ran from July 1, 2020 through June 30 2021.

The Bank's board of directors had decided back in 2019 to allow hearing aid applicants to receive 2 aids instead of just one – if the testing audiologist certified that the person showed a significant need for 2 aids – for the same fee as for one aid.

In a recent meeting, the board decided to eliminate the \$50 application fee that the Bank had been charging. Now the only fee that an applicant pays is a \$50 co-pay, or registration fee, regardless if they receive one aid or two, and that fee goes to the fitting audiologist, not the Bank. As almost all of the aids we place are 12-channel digital aids, that means our applicants are receiving top-of-the-line aids for almost nothing.

Here is a breakdown of the areas where the aids were placed last year, by number of applicants that received one or two aids:

Region 1, Zone A - Amherst County, Appomattox, Brookville-Timberlake, Buckingham County, Lynchburg 7 Hills, Rustburg – 4 persons

Region I. Zone B - Brookneal, Chatham, Danville Host, Danville Morning, Gretna, South Boston – 11 persons

Region II, Zone C - Amelia, Blackstone, Charlotte County, Crewe-Burkeville, Farmville, Kenbridge-Victoria – 2 persons

Region II, Zone D - Chase City, Clarksville, Lawrenceville, South Hill – 0 persons

Region III, Zone E - Bon Air-Manchester-Midlothian, Brandermill-Midlothian-Woodlake, Chesterfield Prevent Blindness, Powhatan, Richmond James River – 12 persons

Region III Zone F - Chester, Colonial Heights, Dinwiddie, Hopewell-Prince George – 8 persons

Region III Zone G/ Zone H - Goochland County, Mechanicsville, Richmond Battlefield Park, Richmond West Breakfast, Varina – 16 persons

The Bank currently has over 700 used aids from which to choose to have re-conditioned and placed with applicants. The aids are constantly being culled to replace older aids with newer ones to ensure that applicants receive the most up-to-date instruments.

Since the Bank relies almost exclusively on donations from the clubs in our service area, we greatly appreciate the donations that have been made in the last year.

If your club would like to have a speaker at one of your regularly scheduled club meetings, we would be happy to send someone to speak to talk about the services of the Bank and how they can benefit the less fortunate people in your area.

We recently lost a board member and need a replacement. The board meets 2-4 times per year for about an hour, so the time commitment is not large.

The Central Virginia Lions Hearing Aid Bank is committed to providing hearing aids to those persons in our coverage area who are unable to purchase them through normal retail channels. Please let the people in your area know that we are here to help them. If you haven't told the Social Services department in your city/town/county, please tell them about us.

Six Virginia Beach Lions Clubs, Princess Anne, Oceanside, Virginia Beach Host, Fil-Am, Thalia, and Town Center Blind Lions, were there "on the SPOT" vision screening 235 students, giving away 100 disposable water bottles, and hundreds of books. While waiting for vision screening with one of the two Spots, Lion Homer Cook engaged young people in a game of Chess.

As students were screened for vision, we referred them to the audiologist group partnered with us, Coastal Hearing and Balance Solutions. Audiologist, Kim Croteau Sparks screened at least half the students for hearing.

Aside from offering our services, we exchanged ideas with other participants and were exposed to the scope of partners supporting the Virginia Beach Public Schools. All in all, a pretty good day for Lionism!

### DISTRICT 24-I Lions Safari Club Visitation Program Rules, Awards, Guidelines July 1, 2021-June 30, 2022



**Purpose**: to provide an opportunity for District 24-I Lion members to meet and make friends with Lions in other clubs, zones, regions, and the District, and to observe how funds were raised and donated, ultimately creating a stronger bond of friendship among the Lions and Clubs throughout the District.

### What constitutes a Visit:

Minimum number of Lions required for a *Lions Safari* Visiting Team

Lions Club Total Membership	Lions Safari Visiting Team
1-10 members	Minimum of two (2) Lions per visit
11-25 members	Minimum of three (3) Lions per visit
26-45 members	Minimum of four (4) Lions per visit
46 or more	Minimum of five (5) Lion per visit

Lions Clubs will only earn credit once for visiting a specific club during the Lions Club year July 1, 2021-June 30, 2022.

- Visit can be scheduled with the club to be visited during regular meetings, Charter, Installation, and other celebrations, or during a DG visit.
- Visits during a ZONE or REGION meeting are allowed.
- Visits must be coordinated with the host club for all meetings at least 2 weeks prior, unless otherwise specified.

### **Visitation Awards:**

**District Governor's Lions Safari Banner Patch**: To earn a DG Banner Patch all clubs must visit at least three (3) clubs in a different Zone and one (1) or more within own Zone. Minimum of four (4). The Eastern Shore clubs are allowed three

(3) in own Zone and one (1) outside their Zone. Attending meeting by Zoomcounts.

**Contest Winner's Trophy and Ward's Corner Foundation Endowment Award**: To earn the winner's Trophy and be awarded the Ward's Corner Foundation Endowment Award of \$500 to be used by the winning club for a charitable donation, Clubs will earn points for the following:

1. Visit Clubs in a minimum 3 Zones of the 6 Regions.

2. How to earn Safari points
Earn 1 point per mile one way travel distance. Using MapQuest fastest Route
3. Bonus Points:
Earn 50 Points for crossing Chesapeake Bay Bridge
Earn 10 Points for crossing the Coleman Bridge over the York River

Earn 20 Points for crossing the Hampton Roads Bridge Tunnel Earn

25 Points for a visit in excess of 100 miles one way.

Earn 20 Points for each Visit in more than 1 REGION.

## **Program Guidelines:**

- 1. Responsibility of Visiting Club:
- a.the Club's Safari Chair should coordinate the planned visit with the Club to be visited President or Secretary or the Zone or Region Chairs holding a meeting, **at least 10 days prior** to date requested to give host club caterer, hotel orrestaurant advance notice of number of additional Lions in attendance.
- **b.**when scheduling a **Lions Safari** visit a Club should have the minimum number of Lions attend and stay for the entire meeting.
- c. the visiting Club's members should arrive promptly and be present when the call to order bell rings.
- **d.** each visiting Club member should be prepared to pay cash or check or use a credit card **if applicable** for their meal.
- e.the Club's Safari Chair should bring the completed Lion Safari Report Form to the meeting for signature by a host club leader.
- f. the Visiting Club must send or email the signed and completed form within 2 weeks to the Lions Safari 24-I Committee Chair listed at the bottom of the form.
- g. the visiting club will receive 50 points for each visit.

#### 2. Responsibility of Visited (Host) Club:

- a. the Club being visited should agree to the date of visit request for a Lions Safari visit whenever possible unless prior plans interfere with request.
- b. Both Visiting and Visited Clubs should follow the Lions Code of Ethics.
- c. Visited Club should never impose special fees or impose fines above usual limits.

3. **Conflict resolution:** Should visiting clubs fail to arrive prior to the call to order bell due to highway, accident, or weather conditions, traffic backups on bridges and in tunnels decision to earn points will be decided on an as needed basis by the visited host Club, the Lions Safari 24-I Committee Chair, and District Governor ifnecessary.
